


Arizona Town Hall's mission of educating, engaging, connecting, and empowering people to solve challenging issues is more important than ever.


During 2023 we engaged over 3,000 people in the following ways:

- 33 interactive community programs on *Equity for All Arizonans*.
- 33 interactive consulting programs on topics such as economic resiliency, workforce development, local government planning, equity, and organizational strategy.
- 13 training programs on leadership and facilitation techniques, including programs with global leaders.
- 3 *Cross-Border Connecting* programs, two virtual and one highly successful in-person event hosted in Hermosillo, Mexico.
- 1 statewide multi-day interactive forum on Bridging Divides to Build Community.
- 5 interactive community programs and presentations on *Mental Health, Substance Use,* and *Homelessness*.
- Additional programs on past town hall topics like Creating Vibrant Communities.

Arizona Town Hall was able to achieve this level of engagement in no small part thanks to high-level professional volunteers who tirelessly aid the organization's limited staff. In 2023, over 110 unique volunteers clocked over 2,300 hours.

These gatherings are designed to galvanize and empower participants to be constructive members of their communities, to engage with others to address pressing issues, and to implement changes not only locally but also on a statewide and regional basis.

Arizona Town Hall educates, engages, connects, and empowers people to resolve important issues through consensus, not division, using a process based on respectful dialogue that values diverse perspectives, builds relationships, and fosters leadership development.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

In 2023, Arizona Town Hall programming brought together communities from across the state and internationally, including in-person, hybrid, and virtual opportunities for engagement.

The *Cross-Border Connecting* series deepened business and cultural connections with virtual offerings that covered preparing students for a career in the global economy and border port infrastructure. The in-person event in Hermosillo, Mexico connected business and political leaders from the region.

Community town halls on *Equity for All Arizonans* engaged diverse participants from Avondale, Bullhead City, Flagstaff, Kingman, Lake Havasu City, Mesa, Nogales, Phoenix, Pinetop, Show Low, Tucson, Wickenburg, Yuma, and many more areas of the state.

The *Bridging Divides to Build Community* multi-day interactive forum gathered statewide perspectives from all sides of the political spectrum the most promising strategies Arizonans can use to rebuild connections for the health of our communities.

Programs on *Creating Vibrant Communities* and *Mental Health, Substance Use, and Homelessness* connected people to needed resources, set priorities for continued success, and initiated action steps for impact.

All of these programs captured input from Arizona's many diverse communities and empowered participants to take action on their recommendations. Reports of recommendations from programs are widely distributed to local stakeholders, community groups, and elected leaders as valuable resource materials.


